## Milestones

A recent count has revealed that we have reached the half way mark in our bungalow refurbishment programme.

24 of our 44 bungalows have been modernised with new kitchens and bathrooms during the last 4 years. That makes an average of 6 per year! The Hall itself has required significant investment with repairs to the lift. Recent changes to Fire Regulations will also require most of the doors in the Hall needing to be replaced. **I was born in Kidderminster in 1922 and had a twin brother. Eventually there were five of us – a happy family.**

After attending High School, on a scholarship, I worked first as a clerk, and then a clerk typist in various firms, finishing up in the Inland Revenue, where I met my husband, Murray.

We married in 1949 and subsequently had our children, Susan and John.

We were Methodists – Murray was a

local preacher and I taught in Sunday School. In 1963 we moved to Barnsley for his work and in 1968 we moved to Pudsey where he worked in Leeds and then Bradford.

My main interest in life has been singing and I have sung solos and been in choirs from when I was at school.

My husband died in 1997 and I moved to Quebec Hall this year. It certainly is a lovely, happy place.

## ABOUT QUEBEC HALL...

**Quebec Hall is now over 250 years old and we are always on the lookout for information about its history.**

Mrs Gwyneth Robinson and her husband John kindly provided us with some very interesting facts concerning the late 1940s and early 1950s when Quebec Hall was a 'Parents National Education Union' school.

In 1950, still in her teenage years, Miss Brown as Gwyneth then was, found employment as a teacher at the school, with responsibility for the younger children between five and six years of age. There were occasions, however, when classes of twelve years and upwards were placed in her care. The total number of pupils at the school was in the region of forty, mainly girls who were taken in until the age of sixteen.

There were also some boys who stayed to the age of eleven. Pupils were mainly the children of local business people, farmers and clergymen. The boarders, who were mainly boys, slept at the very top of Quebec Hall in an area which is now a loft. Fees were in the region of twelve pounds a term and Gwyneth started on a salary of thirty shillings a week, which was later increased to two pounds.

She recalls that the school was run by two rather strict principals and teachers, Miss Tomlin and Miss Hilton. They were assisted by Gwyneth and a young French mistress who had come over from France. Fond memories were evoked of how much the children particularly enjoyed the weekly radio broadcast, 'Music and Movement for Schools.'
