AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL NOTES...

I was born in December 1911 in North East London, on the outskirts of Epping Forest and was one of eight children born to my parents.

My earliest recollections are of the First World War, which commenced in 1914. Although I was only two years old, I clearly remember the sirens going, warning of an air raid and my father coming upstairs to get us up and to take us to safety downstairs.

As we had neighbours next door to us who were members of the Brethren Assembly that was in the next road to ours, we, as children, were taken to Sunday School at Leyton Gospel Hall.

As we grew up we were fortunate in having a good foundation of spiritual teaching. In London there were many gifted, well-known speakers who came to our Gospel and Ministry meetings.

I was converted in April 1927 through the conviction that I was not a Christian and was baptised in October 1929.

I first started to teach in a Sunday School class at the age of 16 in place of teachers who were not available from time to time. A year or two later, I started to teach full time and continued for forty years, finishing up with taking the Girls' Bible Class. For several years I was treasurer of the Sunday School taking the place of a male member of our fellowship who was called up for active service in World War 2. I later took over as Secretary of the Sunday School in place of one of my brothers who moved away from the area.

I worked in London for over 30 years as Secretary to the Chairman of a large group



of companies in the shipping world and retired at the end of 1972.

I moved from Leyton in 1974 and was in fellowship at Alexander Gospel Hall in Westcliffe-on-Sea for 14 years, until I moved to Quebec Hall in Dereham, Norfolk – six years in a bungalow and then in Quebec Hall.


